**WHEREAS**, the safety and well-being of its citizens continues to be one of the foremost concerns of the City of Missoula; ensuring that safety and well-being requires the ability to receive calls for help and immediately send responders to provide that help; and

**WHEREAS**, 9-1-1 is the first critical link in the chain in delivering public safety services; and

**WHEREAS**, the safety of those responding to emergencies is also of great concern to the City of Missoula; and

**WHEREAS**, the telecommunicators who work in 9-1-1 display a superior level of commitment, dedication and professionalism in accomplishing their mission of receiving calls for help from citizens, dispatching emergency response agencies and maintaining a communication link with the responders for safety purposes; and

**WHEREAS**, those same telecommunicators often work extraordinarily long hours and difficult schedules to provide this service to the public and to ensure the safety of responders, but often go unrecognized; and

**WHEREAS**, amid the current public health emergency and global pandemic of COVID-19 these telecommunicators continue to report for duty every day to ensure the continuity of this critical mission.
